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EDU-SYRIA

A Scholarship Programme for Syrian Refugees and Vulnerable Jordanians

AT A GLANCE

- EDU-SYRIA is a framework to help Syrian refugees in Jordan and vulnerable Jordanians from the refugees host communities to get access to higher education through a set of scholarship programmes. The programme supports the "No Lost Generation" strategy, which aims to provide those affected by the conflict with the chance to shape a more stable and secure future.
- EDU-SYRIA is implemented by the German Jordanian University (GJU), in partnership with four educational
- institutes: Zarqa University (ZU), Luminus Technical University College (LTUC), Yarmouk University (YU) and Jordan University of Science and Technology (JUST).
- The European Union funded EDU-SYRIA with 17.6 Million Euro in total. Initially, European Neighbourhood Instrument (ENI) funded EDU-SYRIA programme with 4 Million Euro, then EU Regional Trust Fund in Response to the Syrian Crisis 'Madad Fund' additionally provided 11 Million Euro, and recently toped up the fund with 2.6 Million Euro.
- EDU-SYRIA started in **2015**, and will continue until 2022.
- EDU-SYRIA received more than ten thousand applications from Syrian refugees seeking higher education opportunities out of which 1200 scholarships were granted.
- EDU-SYRIA is expecting a joint effort toward providing a perspective to its graduates.

CORE OBJECTIVES

- 1. EDU-SYRIA main objective is to provide 1590 scholarships in higher education and vocational training to vulnerable refugees Syrian and Jordanians from host communities.
- 2. EDU-SYRIA aims at empowering Syrian refugee students by equipping them with the required knowledge skills to access the labour market.

ACHIEVEMENTS SO FAR

- 1. EDU-SYRIA enrolled 1497 has students in various academic degree programmes with 52% females and 48% males.
- 2. EDU-SYRIA has enrolled 739 Syrian refugee students in Bachelor Degree programmes, 487 students in Higher National Diploma programmes, and 271
- students in various Master Degree programmes.
- 3. The programme has graduated 479 students.

LESSONS LEARNT

- to work while pursuing their studies, due to the limited stipend provided by the programme, which negatively influenced their academic performance
- 1. Syrian refugees' students were forced 2. The English language proficiency of 3. Marriage and pregnancy among Syrian refugee students is moderate, which affected their academic progress. In addition, they were unable to easily secure admissions to the Master Degree programmes.
