Syrian crises Consequences

The Syrian crises have affected the whole region and enforced many Syrians to reallocate to other neighbouring countries seeking peaceful and stable lives. The Syrian students are among those affected by the crisis and were enforced to stop their higher education and interrupt their studies.

In order to help Jordan to cope with these new challenges many worldwide organizations provide Syrian refugees with support to overcome some of their needs. One basic need of those refugees is to have access to higher education system, which is the target of this EU supported project.

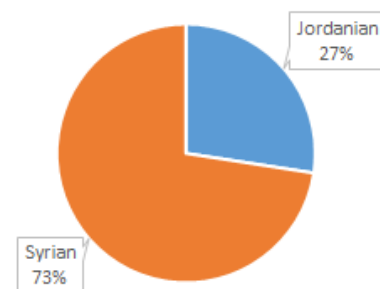
Project Summary

EDU-SYRIA is a framework to help Syrian refugees in Jordan and vulnerable Jordanians from the refugees host communities for further higher education through a set of scholarship programs.

The project consists of two components: EDU-SYRIA I and EDU-SYRIA II, which gives the students the opportunity to pursue an academic or professional educational degrees.

EDU-SYRIA supports the "No Lost Generation" strategy, which aims to provide those affected by the conflict with the chance to shape a more stable and secure future.

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EDU-SYRIA I

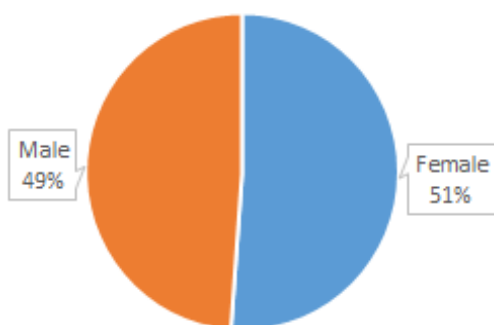
EDU-SYRIA I started in 2015 and will continue to December 2019. EDU-SYRIA I started recruiting students at Zarqa University and Al Quds College in Feb 2016. EDU-SYRIA I aims to provide 390 scholarships.

Project Achievements

The Project enrolled 1289 out of 1390 students so far in various academic and vocational degree programs as follows:

- 574 Syrian refugees' students in different bachelor degree programs out of 600 students.
- 448 students (325 Syrian, 123 Jordanian) out of 480 students in various vocational degree programs towards a BTEC Level 5 Diploma.

EDU-SYRIA II

EDU-SYRIA II started in 2016 and will continue to December 2019. EDU-SYRIA II is Funded by EU MADAD, it started recruiting students at Zarqa University and Al Quds College in Oct 2016. EDU-SYRIA II aims to provide 1000 scholarships.



Students Feedback

"Before getting this scholarship, I was working here and there in order to sustain myself and my family, but I couldn't imagine a bright future," said Hamza Alzoubi, who is currently pursuing a pharmacy degree through the scholarships programme.
